As you probably know, in preparing a comprehensive land-use plan to comply with LCDC requirements we must inventory mineral and aggregate resources in and around the City. Once these resources have been identified, we will take appropriate actions to insure their preservation and/or conservation.

Thus far we've compiled data from DOGAMI's Bulletin No. 66 and from other sources at OIT. Unfortunately, we have yet to get a good description of available building materials such as sand and gravel, which are probably the most significant minerals to the community.

My question is this: is DOGAMI able to offer technical assistance to cities such as us, or lacking that ability, do you or Norm Peterson have any suggestions on alternate sources of assistance? Basically we need help to properly identify sand and gravel deposits and estimate quantities.

Any help or moral support you could lend us would be greatly appreciated. Still no action on geothermal development but we haven't given up yet.
