Hearing aid specialists recommend, select or adapt hearing aids and may alter, adjust or reconstruct hearing aids specifications for proper functionality, such as taking ear impressions for proper fit

### Membership requirements

Members of the council must be residents of this state. A member of the council may not be a member or employee of the office.

Membership on the council shall consist of:

One member who is licensed to practice medicine in this state and holds a certificate of qualification from the American Board of Otolaryngology;

One member who holds a clinical certification in audiology with the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association and is a member in good standing with that association;

Four members who are experienced in the fitting of hearing aids and possess the qualifications provided in ORS 694.055;

One member who is a consumer of hearing aids and does not possess the professional qualifications of the other members.

The term of office of each member of the council is four years, but a member serves at the pleasure of the Governor. Vacancies shall be filled by the Governor by appointment for the unexpired term. A member shall hold the member's office until the appointment and qualification of a successor. A member is eligible for reappointment. If a person serves two consecutive full terms, a period of at least four years must elapse before the person is again eligible for appointment to serve on the council.

The Behavior Analysis Regulatory Board oversees the licensing of behavior analysts and assistant behavior analysts and the registration of behavior analysis interventionists. Applied behavior analysis is a therapeutic modality that is often used to treat people with autism spectrum disorder (ASD).

Four members who are licensed by the board under ORS 676.810;

One member who is a licensed psychiatrist, with experience or training in treating autism spectrum disorder;

One member who is a licensed psychologist, with experience or training in treating autism spectrum disorder;

One member who is a licensed developmental pediatrician, with experience or training in treating autism spectrum disorder;

One member of the general public who does not have a financial interest in the provision of applied behavior analysis and does not have a ward or family member who has been diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder; and

One member who is a parent, guardian or family member of an individual who has been diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder and has received some form of applied behavior analysis therapy.

Not more than one member of the board may be an employee of an insurer.

The appointments of the members of the board are subject to confirmation by the Senate in the manner prescribed in ORS 171.562 and 171.565.

The term of office of each member is four years, but a member serves at the pleasure of the Governor. Before the expiration of the term of a member, the Governor shall appoint a successor whose term begins on November 1 next following. A member is eligible for reappointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make an appointment to become immediately effective for the unexpired term.

A member of the board is entitled to compensation and expenses as provided in ORS 292.495.

The board shall select one of its members as chairperson and another as vice chairperson, for such terms and with duties and powers necessary for the performance of the functions of such offices as the board determines.

A majority of the members of the board constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business.

The board shall meet at least once every year as determined by the office. The board may also meet at other times and places specified by the call of the chairperson or of a majority of the members of the board.

The Board of Athletic Trainers oversees the practice of athletic trainers in the State of Oregon. Athletic trainers prevent, recognize and evaluate athletic injuries and provide immediate care, rehabilitation and reconditioning services to athletes. They work in cooperation with physicians and other allied health personnel and serve as members of the athletic health care team at secondary schools, colleges and universities, sports medicine clinics, professional sports programs and other athletic health care settings.

A member shall hold the member's office until the appointment and qualification of a successor. A member is eligible for reappointment. If a person serves two consecutive full terms, a period of at least four years must elapse before the person is again eligible for appointment to serve on the board.

Before the expiration of the term of a member, the Governor shall appoint a successor whose term begins on January 1 next following. A member is eligible for reappointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make an appointment to become immediately effective for the unexpired term.

The voting members of the board shall select one of the voting members as chairperson and another voting member as vice chairperson. The board shall establish the terms of service for the chairperson and the vice chairperson and the duties and powers of the chairperson and the vice chairperson.

A majority of the voting members of the board constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business.

Official action by the board requires the approval of a majority of the voting members of the board.

The board shall meet at a place, day and hour determined by the board. The board also may meet at other times and places specified by the call of the chairperson or of a majority of the voting members of the board.

(g) One member must be an insurance industry representative who may be a medical director or other administrator.

(h) One member must be a pharmacy representative who engages in the practice of pharmacy at a retail drug outlet.

(3) No more than six members of the commission may be physicians either in active practice or retired from practice.

(4) Members of the commission serve for a term of four years at the pleasure of the Governor. A member is eligible for reappointment.

(2) The board of directors of a mass transit district shall consist of seven members. One director shall be appointed from each of seven subdistricts. The Governor shall appoint as one of the directors a person who regularly uses the services provided by a mass transit system. Directors shall reside in the subdistrict from which they are respectively appointed. The subdistricts shall be as nearly equal in population as possible based on the latest federal census and shall be designed to ensure representation of the most populous city, other cities and unincorporated territory in the proposed district proportionate to their respective populations provided that if less than the entire district is taxed by the district, the subdistricts shall be wholly within the taxed area. The district or, if the taxed area is less than the entire district, the taxed area shall be divided into subdistricts initially, and after each succeeding federal census, by the Secretary of State.

(3) The term of office of a director is four years, but each director shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. Before the expiration of the term of a director, the director's successor shall be appointed. A director is eligible for reappointment. In case of a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall appoint a person to serve for the unexpired term. A director whose term has expired shall continue to serve until the appointment of a successor unless discharged by the Governor.

(4) All appointments of members of the board by the Governor are subject to confirmation by the Senate pursuant to Article III, section 4, of the Oregon Constitution. [Formerly 267.110; 2007 c.71 §80; 2018 c.4 §5]

No more than two of the members of the board may be officials or full-time employees of state or local governments.

At least one public member must be at least 62 years of age.

Public members of the board may not hold any pecuniary interest in, or have any employment contract with, a nursing home or residential care facility.

In selecting the members of the board, the Governor shall strive to balance the representation on the board according to:

Geographic areas of this state, ensuring that at least one member is from a rural area; and Ethnicity.

The term of office of each member is three years but a member serves at the pleasure of the Governor. The terms must be staggered so that no more than three terms end each year. Before the expiration of the term of a member, the Governor shall appoint a successor whose term begins on July 1 next following. A member is eligible for reappointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause the Governor shall make an appointment to become immediately effective for the unexpired term.

A board member shall be removed immediately from the board if, during the member's term, the member:

Is not a resident of this state;

Has been absent from three consecutive board meetings, unless at least one absence is excused;

Is not a licensed nursing home administrator or a retired nursing home administrator whose license as a nursing home administrator was in



good standing at the time of retirement, if the member was appointed to serve on the board as a nursing home administrator; or  
Is not a licensed residential care facility administrator or a retired residential care facility administrator whose license as a residential care facility administrator was in good standing at the time of retirement, if the member was appointed to serve on the board as a residential care facility administrator.

(3) In case of a vacancy on the commission for any cause, the Governor shall appoint a successor to serve for the unexpired term.

(4) A member of the commission may be appointed to serve two consecutive terms. A member who serves two consecutive terms shall not be eligible for reappointment within one year following the expiration of the second term.

(5) A member of the commission is entitled to compensation and expenses as provided in ORS 292.495.

(6) The commission shall select one of its members to chair the commission for such term and with duties and powers necessary to perform the functions of the office as the commission determines.

(7) A majority of the members of the commission constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business. [1967 c.321 §2; 1969 c.314 §28; 1979 c.729 §1; 1985 c.491 §1; 1993 c.209 §6]

359.025 Commission duties. (1) The Oregon Arts Commission shall perform the following duties:

(a) Serve as a body to advise governmental bodies and agencies and private persons on the development and implementation of state policies and programs relating to the arts, heritage, historic preservation, humanities and culture, and to assist in the coordination of these activities.

(b) Advise the Governor, the Director of the Oregon Business Development Department and the Oregon Business Development Commission on all matters relating to the arts that pertain to the powers, duties and functions of the Arts Program of the Oregon Business Development Department.

(c) Develop a recommended biennial budget for the operation of the Arts Program that will be submitted to the director and the Governor.

(d) Seek and receive the views of all levels of government and the private sector with respect to state programs and policies for the promotion and assistance of the arts.

(e) Prepare and submit suggested administrative rules to the director that the Oregon Arts Commission determines are necessary for the operation of the programs of the Arts Program.



- (f) Establish policies and procedures for grant programs administered by the Arts Program, including policies and procedures that:
  - (A) Ensure that the criteria used to determine eligibility for grant awards are designed to take into consideration the regional differences in public access to, or in opportunities for engagement in, arts and cultural development in this state; and
  - (B) Promote investment in communities where opportunities for engagement in arts and cultural development are limited.
- (g) Suggest rules to the director for grant programs administered by the Arts Program, including rules that are consistent with the policies and procedures established by the commission under this section.
- (2)(a) In addition to the duties imposed by subsection (1) of this section, the Oregon Arts Commission shall establish policies and provide management and operational staff support for the Trust for Cultural Development Board.
- (b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, the Trust for Cultural Development Board shall make any decisions relating to the investment and disbursement of moneys in the Trust for Cultural Development Account. [1993c.209 §7; 1995 c.79 §200; 2003 c.713 §1; 2017 c.274 §2]

359.030 Objectives of Arts Program. The objectives of the Arts Program of the Oregon Business Development Department are:

- (1) To complement, assist and strengthen existing or planned programs and activities of public and private associations in the arts to promote the broadest statewide public benefit, while maintaining high artistic and scholarly standards.

[(L)] (J) One member to represent consumers and the public at large.

(b) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint one nonvoting member who is a member of the House of Representatives.

(c) The President of the Senate shall appoint one nonvoting member who is a member of the Senate.

(2) The term of office of each voting member is four years, but a voting member serves at the pleasure of the Governor. Before the term of a voting member expires, the Governor shall appoint a successor whose term begins on January 1 next following. A voting member is eligible for reappointment for one additional term. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make an appointment that becomes immediately effective for the unexpired term.

(3) The nonvoting legislative members shall serve two-year terms and are eligible for reappointment.

- (A) Nearshore Marine or Coast Range
- (B) Willamette Valley
- (C) Klamath Mountains
- (D) West Cascades or East Cascades
- (E) Columbia Plateau or Blue Mountains
- (F) Northern Basin and Range

(c) Three members of the advisory committee shall be appointed from Oregon-at-large. These three members shall have an interest in fish and wildlife conservation or outdoor recreation, especially wildlife-associated recreation such as wildlife viewing, nature photography, nature tourism, outdoor education, or community science.

(d) In making appointments of all nine advisory committee members, consideration should be given to appointing members who possess experience engaging youth, underserved communities and diverse audiences, such as communities of color, tribes, and low income communities, in conservation and recreation activities. Consideration should also be given to members with interests in the economic, social,



and educational benefits of healthy ecosystems.

(f) The Associate Director of Outdoor Recreation, or the Associate Director's designee, shall serve as a non-voting, ex-officio member on the advisory committee.

(g) One member of the Oregon Fish and Wildlife Commission may be designated by the Commission to serve as a non-voting ex-officio member on the advisory committee.

OEBB currently provides benefits for almost 150,000 individuals, including actively employed and retired members and their families.

#### OEBB Vision

OEBB will work collaboratively with participating entities, members, carriers and providers to offer value-added benefit plans that support improvement in members' health status, hold carriers and providers accountable for outcomes, and provide affordable benefits and services.

Key components of the OEBB program are:

- Support Oregon's health care system transformation efforts promoting better health, better care and lower costs.
- Support improvement in members' health status through a variety of measurable programs and services.
- Value-added plans that provide high-quality care and services at an affordable cost to members.
- Measurable goals and programs that hold carriers and providers accountable for health outcomes.
- Encourage members to take responsibility for their own health outcomes.
- Collaboration with participating entities, members, carriers and providers that ensures a synergistic approach to the design and delivery of benefit plans and services.
- Benefits follow all state and federal laws and support participating entities' ability to comply with healthcare-related laws and regulations.

#### Coordinated Care: The Oregon Difference

Through the Coordinated Care Model (CCM), Oregonians are experiencing improved, more integrated care. With a focus on primary care and prevention, health plans using the coordinated care model can better manage chronic conditions and keep people healthy and out of the emergency department.

Key elements of the coordinated care model include:

- Best practices to manage and coordinate care;
- Shared responsibility for health;
- Performance is measured;
- Paying for outcomes and health;
- Transparency and clear information;
- Maintain costs at a sustainable rate of growth.

OEBB works diligently to incorporate these elements into all OEBB medical plans, but they are particularly evident in the structure of the Moda Health Synergy and Summit plans as well as the healthcare delivery system inherent in the Kaiser Permanente plans.



ORS 243.866 outlines specific criteria that OEBC is to emphasize in considering whether to enter a contract for a benefit plan. The Board further defined those criteria to serve as a guide in carrying out its charge.

Before the expiration of the term of a member, the Governor shall appoint a successor to take office upon the date of that expiration. A member is eligible for reappointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make an appointment to become immediately effective for the unexpired term.
- (3) A member of the board is not entitled to compensation, but may be reimbursed from funds available to the board for actual and necessary travel and other expenses incurred by the member in the performance of the members official duties in the manner and amount provided in ORS 292.495 (Compensation and expenses of members of state boards and commissions).
- (4) The board shall select one of its members as chairperson and another as vice chairperson, for such terms and with duties and powers necessary for the performance of the functions of such offices as the board determines.
- (5) A majority of the members of the board constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business.
- (6) The board shall meet at times and places specified by the call of the chairperson or of a majority of the members of the board.
- (7) Appointments of members to the board by the Governor are subject to confirmation by the Senate in the manner prescribed in ORS 171.562 (Procedures for confirmation) and 171.565 (Vote required for confirmation). [2007 c.7 §2; 2011 c.720 §72]

- (f) One representative of a statewide or national labor organization

- (h) Two hospital administrators or their designees
- (i) One pharmacist licensed under ORS chapter 689
- (j) One representative of an ambulatory surgical center or an outpatient renal dialysis facility
- (k) One nurse licensed under ORS chapter 678 who is in active clinical practice

(E) An expert in the field of public health who has a background in academia;

(F) Any three of the following:

(i) A person who has professional experience conducting scientific research regarding the use of psychedelic compounds in clinical therapy;

(ii) A person who has experience in the field of mycology;

(iii) A person who has experience in the field of ethnobotany;

(iv) A person who has experience in the field of psychopharmacology; and

(v) A person who has experience in the field of psilocybin harm reduction;

(G) A person representing the Oregon Liquor and Cannabis Commission who has experience working with the system developed and maintained by the commission under ORS 475C.177 for tracking the transfer of marijuana items;

(H) A person representing the Oregon Department of Justice; and

(I) The following:

(i) During the two-year program development period:

(I) One of the chief petitioners of chapter 1, Oregon Laws 2021; and

Two members shall be public members. One member shall be a certified veterinary technician.

(2) All members of the board must be residents of this state. A public member may not be a person licensed under this chapter or a person who has a spouse, domestic partner, child, parent or sibling who is licensed under this chapter.

(3) A statewide professional association for veterinarians may submit a list of suggested nominees for appointment to veterinarian and public member positions on the board. A statewide professional association for veterinary technicians may submit a list of suggested nominees for appointment to veterinary technician and public member positions on the board. In making appointments to the board, the Governor shall give consideration to the nominees suggested by an association. To the extent practicable, the Governor shall attempt to make board appointments that are broadly representative of the geographic and cultural diversity of the state.

(4) Any appointments to fill vacancies by reason of death, resignation or removal shall be made by the Governor for the residue of the term of the retiring member. All appointments of members of the board by the Governor are subject to confirmation by the Senate in the manner provided in ORS 171.562 and 171.565.

(5) Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prevent assistance being rendered by the executive director of the board in any hearing called by it.

(6) Pursuant to ORS chapter 183 the board may adopt rules necessary for the administration of this chapter.

If a vacancy occurs in the membership of the board for any reason, the Governor shall make an appointment to become immediately effective for the unexpired term.

(b) A board member shall be removed immediately from the board if, during the member's term, the member:

(A) Is not a resident of this state;

(B) Has been absent from three consecutive board meetings, unless at least one absence is excused; or

(C) Is not a licensed chiropractor or a retired chiropractor who was a licensed chiropractor in good standing at the time of retirement, if the board member was appointed to serve on the board as a chiropractor.

The Oregon Patient Safety Commission (OPSC) is a semi-independent state agency with a mission to 1) reduce the risk of serious adverse events occurring in Oregon's healthcare system and 2) encourage a culture of patient safety. OPSC operates two statewide programs that offer a constructive space for healthcare facilities, providers, and patients to build a culture of safer care. The agency promotes shared learning and candid dialogue to reduce the risk of patient harm across Oregon's healthcare system. OPSC's programs are:

- Patient Safety Reporting Program (PSRP): PSRP collects and analyzes information from healthcare facilities about patient harm events. We share the lessons learned to support facilities in improving care and preventing future harm.
- Early Discussion and Resolution (EDR): EDR helps connect patients who experience harm and their healthcare provider so they can speak candidly about what occurred, work toward reconciliation, and contribute to safeguarding others from similar harm.

The Task Force on Resolution of Adverse Healthcare Incidents evaluates the implementation and effects of EDR in Oregon and reports to the Legislature each year. The Task Force may also recommend legislation to improve the resolution of adverse healthcare incidents in the state.

Before the expiration of the term of a member, the appointing authority shall appoint a successor whose term begins on November 1 next following. A member is eligible for reappointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the appointing authority shall make an appointment to become immediately effective for the unexpired term.

(4) The appointment of board members by the Governor is subject to confirmation by the Senate in the manner prescribed in ORS 171.562 and 171.565.

(5) A member of the board is entitled to compensation and expenses as provided in ORS 292.495.

(6) The board shall elect one of its voting members as chairperson and another as vice chairperson, for the terms and with the duties and powers necessary for the performance of the functions of such offices as the board determines. [2001 c.954 §4; 2003 c.713 §8; 2009 c.775 §1]

359.413 Board quorum; meetings. (1) A majority of the members of the Trust for Cultural Development Board constitutes a quorum for the transaction of business.



(2) The board shall meet at least once every three months at a place, day and hour determined by the chairperson. The board also shall meet at other times and places specified by the call of the chairperson or of a majority of the members of the board.

(3) The chairperson shall invite representatives of the core partner agencies to all meetings of the board. [2001 c.954 §6]

- Southwest Region, consisting of the Rogue, Klamath, Goose and Summer Lakes drainage basins and that portion of the South Coast drainage basins south of the mouth of the Rogue River.
- West Central Region, consisting of the Umpqua, Mid Coast, Upper Willamette and that portion of the South Coast drainage basins north of the mouth of the Rogue River.
- North Central Region, consisting of the Umatilla, John Day, Hood and Deschutes drainage basins and that portion of the Columbia River drainage basin above Bonneville Dam.
- Eastern Region, consisting of the Owyhee, Malheur, Grande Ronde, Malheur Lake, Middle Snake and Powder drainage basins.
